Mary McCord and her local team of attorneys from MichieHamlett brought a case in an attempt to prohibit unlawful paramilitary activity after the events of the Unite the Right rally in Charlottesville 2017. Prior to the anniversary of the rally, under the leadership of Mary, the defendants including Jason Kessler and various white nationalist and private militia groups agreed to a settlement prohibiting any such violent activity from occurring in the future. She also has prosecuted Al Qaeda terrorists for the Obama Justice Department and is currently representing the Catholic Diocese of Brownsville in a dispute over eminent domain issues which would leave an 1865 chapel trapped between a wall and the border in a enforcement zone.
